WORDS OF WISDOM

February is a month of “not quite.” The year isn’t quite “new” any more. I’ve mostly stopped writing “2012” where I meant to write “2013.” It’s not quite spring, even though the days are getting longer and it doesn’t quite feel like winter any more. The crocuses in my yard are not quite poking their way through the layers of mulch. It’s not quite Lent, even though Easter comes early this year (Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on February 13th, because Easter is March 31). And, of course, February is not quite as long as other months, and, as the ultimate sign that February is a month of “not quite” those folks who were born on February 29th don’t quite have a birthday every year!

Not quite is about looking ahead and recognizing all the ways that we are “not yet there.” It is also about looking back and realizing how far we’ve come, and celebrating the ways that we are growing and changing. As we in the ELCA celebrate our 25th anniversary as a denomination, one of

our new slogans is “we are a church that is deeply rooted, and always being made new.” We joyfully embrace the gift of the present, while remaining connected to the past and leaning toward the future. “Not quite” is a time of possibility, openness, and potential. It is an ever-present celebration that we are always growing, changing-- and that God is always at work in and through us. “Not quite” is a stance of hope. It is our recognition that God is not quite finished with us, and that we are always being reformed, re-newed, and re-energized for what lies ahead.

One of my friends, an avid gardener, likes to talk about what goes on in the life of plants, especially in this time of not-quite-spring. Even though it doesn’t look like much is happening, (and some plants, in their dormant phase, look dead) beneath the surface of the ground, their roots are going crazy with growth, spreading, deepening, drawing nutrients from the soil, and being nourished by the rain. They are preparing for the explosion of growth that will happen when the warmth of spring arrives. We can’t see it – but it is happening. This time of “not quite” reminds us that what lies fallow is not lifeless, and also that each variety of plant grows at its own pace.

Look around: can you envision the energy and life, the growth that is happening, even when it is beneath the surface, hidden from view? Can you sense the anticipation of waiting until the time is ripe for all that hidden energy to poke its way above the ground? Can you see it – both in the world around us, and in our congrega-

tion? In Christ’s love, we are both deeply rooted and always being made new. Can you glimpse the hope and promise that goes with deepening faith, hospitality, compassionate care, and radiating love? Let us live with patience and hope, with openness to what lies ahead, especially in this season of “not quite.” And let us celebrate all that God is doing among us, even when it may not be clearly in view.



STEWARDSHIP CAPTURE THE VISION

Our stewardship program is an integral part of our vision statement; to reach out and share with the community. In late 2001 our church was a leader in establishing Faith in Action, a nonprofit which would enable seniors and disabled to live in their homes. In 2012 FIA spent \$22,000 in cash benevolence, \$26,000 in individual in kind donations, \$32,000 in organizational in kind donations and approximately 1,600 services.

In 2006 we were again instrumental in the formation of the Coalition of Churches and in 2012 the Coalition fed 20,000 people. This included breakfasts and lunches for children on school vacations, weekly Wednesday community lunch, monthly community Sunday suppers and backpacks for 100 school children that includes food for 7 days. Not only do we provide monetary support for these two programs but many of our members volunteer to help these programs.

In 2010 our church also helped form the Neighbor to Neighbor Food Brigade which is now the Community Food Pantry. This organization now serves over 1,800 people per month.

Twice a year we send sewing kits, health kits, school supplies and baby kits to Lutheran World Relief and our quilting group works every Wednesday to provide more than 100 quilts for Lutheran World Relief and 1 quilt per month to the North Mason Resource Center.

We have a dedicated board for the Child Care who work to make the child care a wonderful experience for all the children attending the school.

The Monday Morning Men's group gives countless hours to the church for the community, helping the daycare, cutting wood for the Faith in Action Wood program.

This congregation is so generous in both financial and labor gifts to both the church and the community and we would like to take this time to thank everyone for their good works.

How to Recognize and Ease Flu Symptoms

Flu and cold symptoms are similar, yet treatments differ. It is important to know the difference so treatment is effective. The flu is treated with prescription medications, but a cold just has to run its course. It is important to treat the flu correctly so it does not progress into something more serious.

Symptoms

Flu starts all of a sudden, out of the blue, while a cold grows gradually worse. Flu comes with a fever and headache along with severe body aches. A cold rarely produces a high fever and body aches are minimal. Extreme exhaustion accompanies the flu along with chest discomfort and a severe cough. A cold may cause fatigue at first, but is not as prominent. A cold usually causes sore throat, watery eyes, runny or stuffy nose and sneezing. Flu sometimes accompanies these symptoms, but not all the time. Flu

can progress to bronchitis or pneumonia while a cold rarely creates more severe problems other than sinus and ear infections.

Prevention

Influenza spreads through the air. Therefore, a sufferer who sneezes without cover contaminates the air. Anyone in the vicinity that breathes the air can catch flu. A sufferer who coughs into the hand, then touches a shopping cart spreads the disease when someone else touches the cart, then touches their eyes or nose. That is why it is important to wipe off shopping carts before using them. Use personal pens to sign charge recipes and if using an electronic pen be sure to wash with hand sanitizer after using. Also sanitize after using ATM machines or any other public aids that are touched. Always wipe down the public or family phone before using.

Treatment

Get plenty of rest as the fatigue that comes with flu lasts several weeks. Drink tea, fruit juice and clear chicken soup. Take ibuprofen for body aches and use a cough suppressant. Create steam by letting hot water run in the shower or use a humidifier. This keeps sinuses open. Prescription medications are available, but most must be taken within the first 12 to 48 hours of the onset. Those with chronic disease, diabetes, AIDS or HIV, those 50 or older, health care workers and teachers should always be immunized every year. They are the ones most likely to become infected or have complications.

And when my old, tired legs don't let me move as quickly as before, give me your hand the same way that I offered mine to you when you first walked.


When those days come, don't feel sad ... Just be with me, and understand me while I get to the end of my life with love.

I'll cherish and thank you for the gift of time and joy we shared. With a big smile and the huge love I've always had for you, I just want to say, I love you, my darling daughter.






