## WORDS OF WISDOM

Labor Day signals the waning of summer, the beginning of the school year, and a reduction in the flow of tourist traffic. It also offers us an opportunity to think about vocation. Although we tend to think of vocation in terms of “what you do (or used to do) for a living,” it involves more than that. Vocation (a word derived from a Latin word that means “calling”) is about more than your job. No matter your age, ability, or employment status, you have a vocation. Your vocation is found where your passion intersects with the world’s needs. Our vocation (calling) is to ministry (service), wherever we happen to be, and it is lived out in love, compassion, prayer and care for our neighbors and for creation.

While we often use the words “calling” and “ministry” in reference to pastors and others who serve religious vocations, clergy are not the only ones called to service. In baptism, all Christians are called to ministry in daily life as

we respond to God’s unconditional and unwavering love for us. Each newly baptized Christian is welcomed into the Christian faith with these words spoken by the congregation: *“We welcome you into the body of Christ and into the mission we share: join us in giving thanks and praise to God and bearing God’s creative and redeeming word to all the world.”*

At the end of worship each Sunday, we are all sent out into the world with words such as, “Go in peace; serve the Lord.” We vigorously respond, “Thanks be to God!” Our service takes many forms, shaped by our personal talents, our specific gifts, and our particular life circumstances. For some of us, living out our vocation means that we roll up our sleeves, work up a sweat and get our hands dirty. For others of us, our vocation may center in praying for others, advocating for justice, listening with compassion, or even being the recipients of care.

We are invited to notice and be thankful for how our work and the labors of others serve the common good and build up community. Police officers, firefighters and others respond to emergencies. Traffic flaggers direct vehicles through construction zones to keep both workers and drivers safe. Grocery clerks are the final link in the supply chain that moves food from the farms to our tables and paper towels from the mill to our countertops. Teachers help children learn to read and do math. Health care workers ease pain and provide medical care. UPS drivers deliver packages to our doorstep. Sometimes the connections are obvious and easy to see; other times, they

are more hidden and indirect. Whether prestigious or mundane, all labor is honorable as it works for the common good, meets human need, cares for creation, fosters creativity, and sustains human community.

*In the just reward of labor,  
God’s will is done.*

*In the help we give our  
neighbor, God’s will is done.*

*In our world-wide task of car-  
ing for the hungry and despair-  
ing,*

*In the harvests we are sharing,  
God’s will is done. (ELW 679,  
verse 2)*

## SEPTEMBER OUTING



September Outing: Join us Friday, September 6 for a congregational outing to the annual Wooden Boat Festival in Port Townsend! Those who wish to carpool can meet at the church at 9:00 a.m. If you prefer to drive on your own, we will meet at the festival (inside the festival area at Point Hudson, in front of the Puget Sound Express whale watching store) at 11:00 a.m. Food & beverages are available from assorted local vendors, or pack a picnic lunch. There is plenty to look at and explore, including an art/craft fair downtown. This is an informal fellowship outing, with as much or as little walking as you would like to do. ## NO KID HUNGRY THIS SUMMER IN NORTH MASON!

Over 40 volunteers from the Coalition of Churches, the Community, and even an Investment Banker who was able to slip away for a couple of hours from Kitsap Credit Union, worked to make sure kids identified by their schools as needing food at home received nutritious food each of the 11 weeks of the Summer Break.

105 "Backpack kids" and their 20 younger brothers and sisters received weekly boxes of food delivered to their homes. Approximately 55,000 food items passed through our CLC Lodge, substituting for school breakfasts and lunches, as well as the backpack food they receive each week during the school year.

Each child received 1/2 doz. eggs, 1/2 gallon of milk, meat, cheese, and fresh fruits and vegetables as well as other food items each week. The last delivery on August 27th included, in addition to the food box, a backpack with school supplies and a set of school clothes from Northwest Children's Outreach Center, so these kids can be prepared for that important FIRST DAY of school!

Kids and families report that these Nutrition Food Boxes make a huge difference, and they are so excited and thankful for the help.

MANY THANKS to all those who donate \$\$\$, to those who

faithfully volunteer, and to Christ Lutheran Church for providing the storage and production space. WE COULDN'T DO THIS WITHOUT YOU!

### PARISH NURSE NEWS Food-related Choking Among Children in the United States

Candy, particularly hard candy, meat, and bones were key foods involved in choking episodes among children ages 0-14 years, according to a report published today by the Center for Injury Research and Policy at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

The first ever multi-year study of food-related choking among children was published in the journal *Pediatrics*. Researchers examined data for children 14 years old or younger treated in emergency departments (EDs) in the United States for nonfatal food-related choking from 2001 through 2009.

#### Key Findings

- Of all known food types, hard candy caused the most (16%) choking episodes, followed by other candy (13%), meat (other than hot dogs) (12%), and bone (12%).
- An average of 34 children per day were treated in EDs for nonfatal food-related choking episodes from 2001 through 2009.
- While most children with food-related choking were treated and released from the ED, 10% were hospitalized.
- Most of these events occurred at home (90%).
- The average age of patients was 4.5 years.

- Children 1 year old or younger accounted for about 38% of all food-related choking episodes.

#### Prevention

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) has recommended numerous measures to prevent food-related choking among children including:

- Labeling high-risk foods with information regarding choking risk to children,
- Monitoring food-related choking incidents with details about circumstances, and
- Educating the public about food-related choking hazards.

#### Advice for Parents and Caregivers

AAP and CDC have recommendations for parents and caregivers to prevent food-related choking among children:

- Children younger than 5 years should not be given hard candies or gum.
- Raw fruits and vegetables should be cut up into strips or non-rounded small pieces.
- Children should sit and be supervised while eating.
- Children should never run, walk, play, or lie down with food in their mouths.
- Parents and caregivers should learn basic first aid and CPR.
- If the child is having breathing difficulties, but is still able to speak or has a strong cough, call 911.
- If the child cannot breathe at all, then they need immediate attention. Call 911 and administer first aid.




## MEN'S BIBLE STUDY & BREAKFAST

CLCCC will be closed September 2, 2013 for Labor Day.




